

## PARENT IMPLEMENTED MODELS FOR AUTISM: GOOD NEWS AND BAD NEWS

## A Message from Dr. Rick:

Well, I have some good news and some bad news. The good news is that a flurry of very recent scientific reviews (<u>Dijkstra</u>, et al; <u>Francis</u>, et al) of parent implement models that use a developmental relationship and play-based (PIM DRP) approach have consistently concluded that PIM DRP are very effective both in empowering parents to engage with their hard to engage autistic children AND in helping the children improve in their relationship abilities. This is no surprise to followers of The PLAY Project! That's the good news, but wait—there's more good news. In California, an Easter Seals Early Start (birth to three) program has been approved to provide The PLAY Project for the youngest children with 'red flags' for autism while waiting for an accurate diagnosis!

The bad news is, across the country, children on the spectrum continue to suffer long waits for diagnosis and for intervention when they could be getting PIM DRP before they even receive a diagnosis! It's hard to understand why so very few insurance companies are covering PIM DRP services even though autism has been determined to be a biological, often genetically influenced, neurologic medical condition.

In November, on a national stage at the Division for Early Childhood ( DEC) conference, I will be presenting the following 5 arguments as to why insurance companies should cover PIM DRP: *First*, there is a significant unmet need which PIM DRP can help meet because these models are efficient, much less costly, and can serve large numbers of children. *Second*, PIM DRP provides the intensity that autistic children need to reach their full potential. *Third*, the research evidence is now solid with multiple reviews indicating benefit. *Fourth*, PIM DRP especially addresses the social challenges that are at the core of autism. *Fifth*, PIM DRP adds a new and complementary approach to therapist delivered services. After all, one type of intervention cannot meet the needs of all children with this diverse condition.

Empowering parents to help their own children is a public policy idea whose time has come! Let's get this done and turn the bad news into great news for families. Let's all reach out to our insurance companies and let them know that they can get children off wait lists and serve many more children at less expense.


